- We were sorry to hear of the recent passing of William (Bill) J. Mackie, and extend our sincere condolences to his friends and family. A long time representative of the Canadian government on spill control issues, Bill suffered a heart attack while finishing a training course in Abu Dhabi (UAE) two weeks ago. Dave Usher recalls working with Bill during Desert Storm, wherein they both were providing advice and assistance to various governments in the Middle East regarding the clean up of oil spilled in the Persian Gulf during the war.
- ◆ Sorbent Product Company ("SPC") recently introduced their newest product, the "Barrier Battlemat™". - A satellite monitoring system is being set up by the Spanish government in an effort to tackle recurring pollution caused by tankers that are flushing their tanks as they sail through the Strait of Gibraltar in southern Spain. The Strait is known for its strong currents and volatile weather conditions. The system will enable Spanish authorities to trace the origin of any oil slick, including when the oil was released and who released it, irrespective of weather conditions or time of day. - ◆ That satellite system could come in handy in the United Arab Emirates ("UAE"), where officials believe ships have been illegally dumping oil residue generated from tank washings in the wake of the sinking of the tanker "Zainab" on April 14th off the coast of Jebel Ali. They believe irresponsible tanker owners are taking advantage of the oil slick resulting from the sinking of the "Zainab" to hide their own illegal discharges. Since it is not uncommon to have up to 100 ships at anchorage within a half a mile of each other in the UAE's territorial waters, and considering rapid oil dispersion rates, it is very difficult for UAE officials to pinpoint which ship or ships are responsible for the discharges. - ◆ Jones Act in the news . . . U.S. shippers will be urged by shipping interests in Europe and Japan to speak out against protectionist maritime legislation during an upcoming meeting in Washington. Representatives from the Consultative Shipping Group ("CSG") — which

represents 13 European countries and Japan – will meet with officials of the Bush administration to discuss the Jones Act. As you know, the Jones Act in part prevents foreign ships from operating coastal trade services in the U.S. The group will also meet with officials from the National Industrial Transportation League, which represents U.S. shippers, and are expected to encourage them to speak out on the added cost to business of anti-competitive laws. - ◆ On the move again . . . SEACOR SMIT, Inc. and Stirling Shipping Holdings Limited recently announced that they had closed the acquisition by SEACOR of all the outstanding share capital of Stirling Shipping. As you may recall, the companies signed a letter of intent in March 2001 for SEACOR to acquire all of the issued share capital of Stirling Shipping and certain subsidiaries. (Source: Press Releases)
- ◆ It was reported earlier this week that President Bush had drafted an executive order that would put the Federal Emergency Management Agency ("FEMA") in charge of all federal efforts to combat terrorism. The order would essentially establish an Office of National Preparedness within FEMA that would respond to terrorist incidents involving weapons of mass destruction. Many questions about how the new agency will run, and how its head will be appointed, have been raised and will likely be answered in the weeks ahead.
